applied for rental assistance. These individuals could face eviction if they do not receive assistance before the 60-day period set in Senate Bill 278 expires, and

- 2. Historically, recovery from an economic downturn takes longer for communities of color. Low-income communities of color have always faced disproportionate barriers to economic opportunities that allow them to pay rising rents and other housing costs. But the COVID-19 pandemic created additional obstacles for those communities, which will continue to exist beyond the lifting of public health restrictions and the statewide eviction moratorium. Statewide landlord data on renters' ability to pay rent has shown consistent volatility in properties that are generally more affordable to low-income households, and
- 3. Extending the protection from eviction established by SB 278 will ensure that providers have sufficient time to reach these households and process rent assistance applications, mitigating further disproportionate impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on local communities of color, and
- 4. This Ordinance does not relieve tenants of the obligation to pay rent. It is designed to provide sufficient time for both tenants and landlords to secure emergency financial assistance as provided by funding designed to respond to the economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic.
