## **Meeting Summary**

1. Welcome & Introductions	
2. Project Updates:	
a. Intensive Services provider	CODA, Inc., was chosen as the provider for the CATT intensive services. Deputy Director Kevin Mahon was introduced and gave a short summary of services that CODA currently provides in Washington County. CODA is excited to be a part of such an important project.
b. Architect	Holst Architectural was chosen. They have a lot of experience in designing and building this type of facility. Holst just finished a detox/residential building for <u>Fora</u> <u>Health in SE Portland</u> . We will have a designer for each of the two buildings. Holst's proposal had a lot of focus on community engagement. <u>Discussion</u> Q: Is this okay to share publicly now?
	A: Yes, please share.
3. Funding Progress Report	Since we last met in May, we have been able to garner \$13,181,811 in new funds, bringing us to nearly being fully funded.
	Our current gap in funding is \$2,630,585.
	Discussion
	Q: Is there a revised timeline?
	A: We expect to have some services operational by the end of 2024, and phase in the remaining services in 2025.

	Q: Are there contingency costs set aside for construction and materials? A: Yes, we have built in two separate 20% contingencies, and these are included in the financial analysis. One is for capital costs and the other for operations. But we do know this is a very dynamic situation.
4. De-Stigma Campaign:	
a. Proposed Messages	The planning process has begun. We have identified key messages with help from the Community Engagement Advisory Group. Video production is scheduled.
b. Format	The format will be multiple 30 second videos and one longer compilation video. We will offer these in a variety of languages with diverse speakers.
c. Recruitment of Participants	We have some CATT Champions identified and are actively recruiting for more.
	<u>Discussion</u> Q: In the key messages, did your advisory group say anything about how addiction affects every race, gender, religion, socioeconomic level, professional group, etc? Thinking about the equity point of view and "those people" sort of thinking some folks fall into. A: Yes, we are very much aware of this, and it is forefront.
	<ul> <li>Q: This is kind of a dream thought, but how about a "Ted Talk" type fundraiser for CATT with our champions? One resource might be Dave Mowry who teaches people to do comedy about mental illness.</li> <li>A: Very interesting idea! We will note this for further discussion.</li> </ul>
