PROJECT SUMMARY: Community Action Organization (CAO) is requesting \$161,798 in FY 2022/20223 ESG funding and an estimated \$161,798 in FY2023/2024 ESG funding and the provided SHS match for a two-year grant to provide short- and medium- term rental and utility assistance as well as housing stability case management services for low-income, ESG eligible participants. The project will serve 70 households over the two-year period.

ESG funds will be used for short-term and medium-term rental and/or utility support. ESG funds will be used directly on financial assistance. 12% of the Supportive Housing Services (SHS) match will be used for Admin expenses, with the remaining to be used on financial assistance to those within the urban growth boundary and housing stability case management services throughout the entire county. Rental and utility assistance will be required to be made directly to the landlord or vendor.

SPONSOR: Family Promise of Tualatin Valley

TITLE: Homeless Prevention

PROJECT SUMMARY: Family Promise of Tualatin Valley (FPTV) is requesting \$161,798 in FY 2022/20223 ESG funding and an estimated \$161,798 in FY2023/2024 ESG funding and the provided SHS match for a two-year grant to provide short- and medium- term rental and utility assistance as well as housing stability case management services for low-income, ESG eligible participants. The project will serve 86 households over the two-year period.

ESG funds will be used to fund a 1.0 FTE Case Manager and .2 FTE Program Manager for housing stability case management. The remainder of the funds will be used for rental and utility arrears (one time payment for up to 6 months of arrears) and rental assistance. If allowed, \$50,000 will be used for rapid rehousing in year two. Rental and utility assistance will be required to be made directly to the landlord or vendor.

Note: It has been verified with the applicant that the number of people to be served represents an UNDUPLICATED count. The project sponsor will be required to obtain income and race and ethnicity data from each beneficiary to ensure ESG program eligibility.

6. National Community Development Week and Fair Housing Month

Shannon reviewed the upcoming plans for National Community Development week. April 10-14th is National Community Development Week and April is Fair Housing Month.

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The Office of Community Development will be asking for jurisdictions to adopt a proclamation celebrating both Community Development and all the projects funded through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and HOME programs, as well as Fair Housing Month. The Washington County Board of Commissioners will be asked to make both proclamations at their April 4th, 2023 meeting.

In addition, OCD staff will be preparing small displays highlighting CDBG and HOME projects in each city. Staff will work with local libraries and/or city halls (in addition to Washington County's Public Services Building) to ensure the displays are in visible areas for community members to view during that week.

7. MISCELLANEOUS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

Shannon shared the Office of Community Development has partnered with Clean Water Services to apply for ARPA Funds from DEQ. We were awarded a 1-million-dollar grant to replace aging septic systems and or connect to existing sewer lines for low- and moderate-income households. One staff member will be adding hours to his part time schedule to facilitate this program.

Shannon highlighted a HOME Project with some progress photos from the City of Tigard Senior Housing project. This is a 57-unit project next to the Tigard Senior Center.

The Project Homeless Connect had their one-day event at the end of January. It was very successful, this event made it possible for many to access several services all at once. This was one of the first events post covid.

The next PAB meeting will be on March 9th, 2023 @ 7pm.

Chair Stephanie Jones adjourned the meeting at 7:43 pm.
