



#### FY 2023-24 Budget Equity – Two Tools

- Community-facing Org Units:
  - Civil Rights, data, community engagement, equitable services, and equitable organizational development.
- Internally facing Org Units:
  - Civil Rights and equitable organizational development.

## Department-Requested Equity Investments





Culturally specific service delivery: \$4,880,665 (vs \$21,052,868 in FY 22-23 budget)

Community engagement: \$3,245,034

**Equitable organizational development:** \$1,945,629 (vs \$3,409,485 in FY 22-23)

**Interpretation, translation & accommodations:** \$435,941 (vs \$1,124,528 in FY 22-23)

Bilingual staff pay differential: 194 full-time equivalent staff (vs 180.5 FTE in FY 22-23)



### Internal Service Cost Allocation

Methodology change in FY24

- Move internal service (IS) functions from the General Fund to individual IS funds
- 2. Use full cost recovery to allocate IS costs
- 3. Use forward looking IS costs to establish cost allocation rates

FY24 impact: this will reduce the overall GF budget but fully cost (increase) budgets for external service departments in the GF.



#### **ENHANCED SHERIFF'S PATROL DISTRICT (ESPD)**

- Formed by Board of Commissioners
   Law enforcement services for and approved by voters in 1987
- In 1987 the Washington County's Public Safety Review Committee recognized one officer per 1,000 as a minimum service standard
- residents in the urban unincorporated areas
- Continuous voter approval for over 35 years
- Approved by voters in May 2022, services will continue services through 2028





The ESPD provides law enforcement services for about 218,500 residents in the urban areas outside of cities in Washington County, including:










#### **ESPD: SERVICE LEVELS**



Officer's per thousand Residents in unincorporated Washington County

- Three funding sources combine to maintain core law enforcement services
  - **O**Urban unincorporated
  - ®Rural unincorporated
- ESPD increases service levels in urban unincorporated areas
- Service levels based on metric of officers per thousand population

- Enhanced Sheriff's Patrol District (established 1987)
- Public Safety Local Option Levy (established 2001)
- General Fund






## **ESPD Funding Provides**

- 9-1-1 emergency response
- Follow-up on incidents impacting neighborhood safety and livability
- Deputies trained and prepared to respond to emerging and complex community issues
- Advanced training in crisis intervention and de-escalation to respond appropriately to individuals experiencing a mental health crisis
- Resources and livability support for those impacted by houselessness
- Criminal investigations



**Fund 210** 


- Non-operating fund
- Holds property tax revenues for the District and disperses funds for ESPD Operations.
- Tracks all costs related to providing information to the public in the preparation of a ESPD ballot measure

Fund 182

- Operating fund
- Funds law enforcement patrol operations inside the ESPD geographic boundaries.

#### **District Patrol Budget Request**


- \$37,873,984

## **Fentanyl Crisis**

- Fentanyl distribution wide reaching, dangerous, and increasing
  - 2021 58,000 pills seized
  - 2022 766,840 pills seized
- Fentanyl can be easily confused for other pills or substances - cases impacting the entire community
- Limitations of enforcement
- Increased need for proactive efforts and creative solutions
  - K9 Mando trained and certified to detect fentanyl





## **Adapting Responsive Service**

#### **Deputy training**

- Drug Recognition Experts (DRE)
- Mental Health Response Team
- School Resource Officers

#### Safety precautions

Property and Evidence Seizure/PPE

#### Narcan deployments

- Deputies carry Narcan and are trained to administer
- 56 deployments in 2023

#### **Community Outreach**


- Community Conversation about Fentanyl (BSD)
- One Pill Can Kill campaign






## **Partnering with Community**










### What is the URMD?



#### 1. Road Maintenance

URMD's primary responsibility

#### 2. Service Requests

 Respond to direct requests from community members

#### 3. Neighborhood Streets Program (NSP)

- Improve multi-modal safety
- Involve area residents in solving local traffic issues

#### 4. Pedestrian and Biking Improvements

- Improve specific community concerns
- Address connectivity needs




## Surface Maintenance by Year

## Pedestrian and Biking Improvement Program

- Project eligibility
  - Within the URMD boundary
- Project selection process
  - Biennial (since 2017)
  - Selected by URMDAC
- Program to date (began in 2011)
  - Projects completed: 49
  - Projects scheduled to begin construction in calendar year 2023: 16
