

While state and national trends show upticks in homelessness, the number of people experiencing homelessness in Washington County is trending downward, and most importantly, **declined 22% among people experiencing chronic homelessness**.

OUR COORDINATED COMMUNITY RESPONSE INCLUDES:



10 COORDINATED OUTREACH TEAMS

with 'by-name lists' to connect people to immediate shelter and housing services.

440 SHELTER BEDS

with specific programs for families, youth, couples, individuals, and their pets.





HOMES FOR 2,000+

formerly homeless households with wrap-around services and rent assistance.

1,500+ HOUSEHOLDS STABILIZED IN THEIR HOMES

with funds for eviction prevention, deposits and housing search supports.


