2013 Point-In-Time (PIT) Homeless Count

2013 PIT will be divided into 10 geographic areas like last year. This year the count will be a blitz in connection with HandsOn Portland. The effort will saturate each geo area on each of the 10 days of the count. Procedures have been put in place to reduce duplication. The volunteers will go out in 2s in 4 hour shifts, and there will be 3 levels of experience. Veterans Affairs is participating with 'stand downs' at various VA related facilities, i.e. VFW, American Legends. As in previous years they are collecting items for distribution. Oregon Food Bank wants to expand the school based pantries. Some families do not feel comfortable going to a church based pantry. Some schools 90% of the children are eligible for free or reduced lunches making school based pantry a good alternative. OFB did a survey and determined that what schools reported as a pantry was actually a supply of crackers and other such items. They are working with the Luis Palau Association to solve this problem. February or March a new documentary will be out addressing this problem. There are no real school based pantries in Washington County. Oregon Food Bank will be having a meeting with interested parties to work on childhood hunger on Wednesday, January 9th at 10:30 to Noon at Oregon Food Bank-West: 1870 NW 173rd Avenue, Beaverton, OR 97006.

Questions were asked as to cost of the various problems and if there was adequate food available. The back-pack program usually distributes 30 packs per month at a cost of \$300/pack. This cost is reduced many times by donations. The cost of the school based program is minimal once established. Initial start-up costs such as shelving are the biggest expense. If there is adequate food available thru the OFB depends upon the time of year.
