The unsheltered population reported a net decrease of 127 people for a total of 232 unsheltered people in 2019 PIT, as compared to 359 people in 2018 PIT. The decrease is in adult-only households.

#### CHANGE IN PIT COUNT METHODOLOGY AND EXPANDED TRAINING

\* 125 new Seasonal Beds (zero beds in 2018) were available the night of January 23, 2019 to provide overnight severe weather shelter that served primarily adult-only households. The three shelter sites entered data into HMIS which is reflected in the increased emergency shelter count data.

\* 131 volunteers (39 volunteers in 2018) conducted the PIT in all major urban centers on the same date - January 23, 2019 - to include the cities of Cornelius, Forest Grove, Hillsboro, Beaverton, Tigard, and Sherwood. In the six days following, volunteer teams covered known locations where outreach staff have previously identified people staying, as well a service-based count at locations to include soup kitchens, homeless drop-in day centers, etc.

\* 6 training sessions (4 training sessions in 2018) were hosted with in-depth review on HUD guidance and review of written instructions to provider agencies and volunteer interviewers. Volunteers were trained on conducting interview using a lens of racial equity and trauma informed care.

#### INCREASED SHELTER AND RAPID RE-HOUSING CAPACITY

\* 125 new Seasonal Beds provided at three faith-based overnight severe weather shelters.

\* 14 new year-round emergency shelter beds in the Family Promise of Beaverton program opened in April 2018 to serve families.

\* 28 new rapid re-housing beds were created based on the ESG consultation with the CoC that prioritized and shifted ESG from prevention to rapid re-housing.

\* 25 additional rapid re-housing beds were occupied in CoC Program-funded projects serving families - CoC RRH for Families and Housing Stabilization Program. These new beds are a result of increased utilization of HUD-funded CoC Program projects.

\* 18 additional rapid re-housing beds in the Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF) rehousing program.
