Goodwill Job Connect Program

The Goodwill Job Connect Program is a community-based job support system with five offices in Washington County. These offices provide resources necessary to offer four different aspects of job searching; Tools, Leads, Skills and Support.

Offices contain computers which can offer uninterrupted access unlike library or some other computer access points. Using these computers, job seekers can search for jobs online as well as create/update resumés and cover letters. Additionally, some seekers haven't had the opportunity to use computers in their past positions. The employment specialists provide side-by-side coaching to improve computer skills.

Employment specialists assist with finding leads via Craigslist and other sites and provide interviewing tips. They can conduct mock interviews to help seekers feel more comfortable before interviewing, and debrief after interviewing to help the job seeker pinpoint what went well, what can be improved upon, etc. Employment specialists also have access to referral services such as Dress for Success and Best Foot Forward. Since applicants must apply daily, employment specialists assist by forwarding information from staffing agencies and temporary services, sending emails regarding employer opportunities and conducting "Meet the Employer" events.

These services are funded by the stores, as are the salaries for Job Connection staff. Statistics are measured and verified: Last year, Job Connections resulted in 13,600 placements. Some were multiple, i.e.; two or three temporary placements for one individual.

Mission: To provide vocational opportunities to individuals with barriers to employment.

Question from Gordon Teifel: Who does Job Connections not serve? Answer: Individuals under 16 years of age; those who are not legally allowed to work in the United States; those who would not readily pass a drug test.

Question from Annie Heart: Childcare is a barrier. How is this issue being addressed? Answer: Job Connections helps troubleshoot the childcare issue with the job seeker by helping them brainstorm to identify friends, neighbors, family and other resources. Once a seeker is hired, DHS has childcare resources.

There are currently less applicants for job postings than in the past, but they are not sure whether this means that there is less need or less qualified applicants. They have been involved with job fairs, PCC and networking events, and when indicated, they call employers to ask what they are looking for.

Outcomes of the Non-Housing Needs and Citizen Surveys for the 2015-2020 Consolidated Plan

The two surveys were conducted via Survey Monkey to receive feedback on needs to be addressed in the 2015-2020 Consolidated Plan for Washington County and the City of Beaverton. The Focus groups included feedback from minorities and persons who are low-income. The results of these surveys were used to create Objective Statements to be used in Year One of the 2015-2020 Consolidated Plan. The Objective Statements derived from these surveys were provided to HSSN for their review and comment before seeking approval from the Policy Advisory Board for its use for grant applicants to qualify potential projects in the 2015-2015 CDBG funding cycle.

Slides were shared detailing the results of the Non-Housing Needs survey, which was sent to service providers and cities. Most responses addressed the overwhelming need for Public Services.

The Citizen Survey was bi-lingual, and had 584 initial participants both online and via paper. Focus groups included minorities, low-income and others; some groups were led by professors from Pacific University. Additional surveys were sent in July to the Section 8 waitlist to increase the number of responses received from persons who are low-income. These ~200 responses were not included in the presentation, as they were received yesterday.

A variety of needs were identified for infrastructure-related projects, including street improvements and sidewalks. Public Facility needs identified included a variety of needs for senior centers, parks (including greenbelts or linear parks), and other facilities intended to serve low-income and vulnerable populations. The majority of Public Service needs identified were for homeless services, tying many of the strategies in the 10-year Plan to End Homelessness into the needs identified in the Consolidated Plan. Other public service needs identified included health and child care needs, as well as landlord/tenant legal issues. Economic Development needs for the City of Beaverton and the City of Hillsboro include Microenterprise programs as well as storefront façade improvement programs.

Sharon Nielson mentioned the need to involve other plans when considering the Consolidated Plan, i.e.; Aloha-Reedville.

Lauren Sechrist said that needs identified in the Aloha-Reedville Planning study were incorporated into the needs identified in the proposed Objective Statements to be adopted under the 2015-2020 Consolidated Plan, but the ability to perfectly align these two studies as suggested would be difficult going forward because they each attempt to accomplish two different objectives. Lauren reported that there are compliance requirements and timelines involved with public funding and in producing the Consolidated Planning document that would make trying to dovetail these efforts problematic.

Vicki Skryha clarified that the Consolidated Plan is a broadly-used document for public use and governs the use of not only Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds, but also HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funding and must be submitted to HUD in a prescribed format and manner, and governs primarily the use of public funds in the community and for Washington County as a whole.

The results of these surveys will be posted on the Washington County Office of Community Development website and the City of Beaverton Community Development website.
