## Results: Deputies Arrest 47 Impaired Drivers During Labor Day Holiday

During enhanced Labor Day holiday patrols from August 17 to September 3, Washington County Sheriff's Office deputies arrested 47 impaired drivers. Of those 47 arrested, five involved drug-related impairment.

The Sheriff's Office reminds the public to always drive sober or plan a safe ride home ahead of time. The original media release below.

## Deputies Conducting Enhanced Impaired Driving Patrols During Labor Day Holiday

August 16, 2018 – The Washington County Sheriff's Office, in partnership with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT), and Oregon State Sheriff's Association (OSSA), will be conducting high visibility enforcement patrols looking for impaired drivers during the Labor Day holiday. The campaign runs August 17 through September 3, 2018.

According to the NHTSA, 37,461 people were killed in motor vehicle traffic crashes in 2016, and 28 percent (10,497) of those fatalities were in crashes during which a driver had a blood alcohol concentration (BAC) over the legal limit of .08.

On average, a driving under the influence arrest costs \$10,000 in attorney fees, fines, court costs, lost time at work, higher insurance rates, car towing and repairs, and more.

There are many other ways to ensure a safe ride home besides relying on a friend. The options include using public transportation, calling a taxi, or using a rideshare program such as Uber or Lyft. In addition, <u>NHTSA's SaferRide Mobile App</u>, available in the app store, is another resource to help those who have been drinking find a sober ride home—by identifying their location and helping to call a taxi or a friend to pick them up.

Please do your part in keeping our roadways safe and help keep impaired drivers from getting behind the wheel. If you plan on drinking or consuming drugs, designate your sober driver. And remember: Friends Don't Let Friends Drive Drunk.



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
