Deputy Rescues Elderly Woman from Burning Home in Aloha


On Wednesday, August 11, 2021, at 9:49 p.m., Washington County Sheriff's Office deputies responded to a house fire in the 18000 block of SW Division St. in the community of Aloha. This is part of the Enhanced Sheriff's Patrol District (ESPD). An 88-year-old woman called 9-1-1 to report that she was trapped inside her burning home and could not escape. She was also worried she was about to lose consciousness with all the smoke in her home.

When the first deputy arrived, he saw heavy smoke coming from the windows and doors of the house. Knowing someone was trapped inside, Deputy Joshua Friant opened the door and called into the house to see if anyone was inside. He heard a woman's voice calling out to say she couldn't get out and needed help.

Deputy Friant crawled inside through the smoke until he found the woman sitting at a table. She was unable to move from her location without a walker. The deputy helped her to the ground to avoid the heavy smoke and was able to help her out of the house.

Additional deputies, <u>Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue</u>, and <u>Metro West Ambulance</u> arrived to fight the fire and render medical aid to the woman who was rescued.

The woman was transported to a local hospital for treatment and is currently in good condition.
